Presidential Limits

- 1. Congress can remove the President by impeachment.
- 2. Congress can pass a bill even if the President vetoes it.
- 3. Congress must approve how money is spent.
- 4. Only Congress can declare war.



Limits of the Branches of Government Congressional Limits

- 1. The President can veto (disapprove) bills of Congress.
- 2. The Supreme Court can say a law is unfair.

Judicial Limits

- 1. The President appoints federal judges.
- 2. Congress must approve the President's appointments of judges.
- 3. Congress can remove a judge.
